Hello all! Let me start by saying that I am truly honored to serve as the Assistant Director for Families Helping Families of Southeast Louisiana. I began working at Families Helping Familes of Jefferson as the EarlySteps' Community Outreach Specialist before moving to the FHFSELA office serving parents and families in Orleans, St. Bernard, and Plaquemines Parishes. At FHFSELA I have served as the EarlySteps' Community Outreach



Specialist, the Data Entry Specialist, and now the Assistant Director. My journey to become an advocate was inspired by my daughter.

My daughter is a great kid with an awesome smile and a big presence. She was diagnosed with a rare developmental disability called Freeman Sheldon Syndrome. This syndrome affects her ability to walk and talk. She communicates non-verbally and is non-ambulatory. Like many other parents of children with developmental disabilities, I felt completely lost. I looked for support groups and medical care. But in the beginning, help in the way of Waiver Supports, education (IEPs and 504 accommodations), and financial supports never occurred to me.

My passion for educating parents is one that is reflective of my desire to know my rights and advocate for my own daughter.

While working for FHFSELA my knowledge in all aspects of the disabilities world has expanded. I am dedicated to promoting awareness that all parents and families need as they prepare for their children's academic success, progression in life skills, life after school, and individual growth as a person with a disability. FHFSELA serves all ages, birth to death, and in this capacity we are able to reach all ages. We have partnered with new family centered organizations to bring awareness and provide services to more people with developmental disabilities and their families. We appreciate all of the organizations that have chosen to partner with us.

So as we move into the holiday season, remember to continue to let your voices be heard! We as the disabilities community matter- as individuals, as families, as support systems- we matter in this world. From all of us here at FHFSELA, have a safe and happy holiday.

WE WELCOME A NEW STAFF MEMBER



I would like to thank you in advance for giving me the opportunity to work with your family. My name is Tomorow Fondal. I am the new EarlySteps Community Outreach Specialist for Orleans Region 1 and 10. Region 1 covers Orleans, St. Bernard, and Plaquemines Parishes. Region 10 covers Jefferson Parish. I am the parent of a young child with a disability, who receives early intervention services.

My youngest son was born with diaphragmatic paralysis and chronic lung disease on his right side and requires oxygen 24 hours 7 days a week. He has been enrolled

in EarlySteps since late January, 2014 but was hospitalized due to contracting Influenza A. He remained hospitalized until mid, May, 2014. Since he was released from hospitalized, he has worked with his EarlySteps Team at least once a week. He is now sitting independently and crawling.

I became involved with EarlySteps as a Family Service Coordinator. Little did I know that I would be utilizing the program for my baby and family; however, it is beneficial that I have experience with receiving and case management components of the EarlySteps. As a Family Service Coordinator, I played the role of a case manager to coordinate services the families received and an advocate on the team but as a parent, I try my best to lead the team.

Now as a Community Outreach Specialist, I want to help you advocate, find or identify resources/ support groups and/or opportunities to empower you to continue to lead as well as play an integral role on your Early Steps Team.



WHAT IS ACT 833 (HB 1051) OF 2014?

HB1015 provides for Individualized Education Program teams of certain students with disabilities to have the option of determining alternative pathways for students with disabilities to advance to the next grade (promotion) and graduation. This bill in no way changes any of IDEA and the federal mandates as required that protects students with disabilities.

ASK AN ADVOCATE

Dear Education Advocate,

My child is being bullied at school because of his disability. Is there anything I can do about this?



Absolutely! You can incorporate a Bullying Plan into your child's IEP. Now, this would be specific to each child and address the particular problems each child is having. Some examples of things that might be included are:

- Leaving class early to avoid other students in the hallways.
- Creating a system to have teachers document all bullying cases.
- Assign the child a safe place or person to go to in times of need.
- Having staff shadow the child while in areas of distress.
- Making sure the school has a bullying education plan in place.

Remember, you know your child best, and you can best advocate for your child and his needs. Do not hesitate to call IEP meetings for a bullying plan. If your child is old enough, have him involved in the process too.

Ideas for National Disability Employment Awareness Month

Held each October, National Disability Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM) is a national campaign that raises awareness about disability employment issues and celebrates the many and varied contributions of America's workers with disabilities. The theme for 2014 is "Expect. Employ. Empower."

NDEAM's roots go back to 1945, when Congress enacted a law declaring the first week in October each year "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week." In 1962, the word "physically" was removed to acknowledge the employment needs and contributions of individuals with all types of disabilities. In 1988, Congress expanded the week to a month and changed the name to "National Disability Employment Awareness Month." Upon its establishment in 2001, ODEP assumed responsibility for NDEAM and has worked to expand its reach and scope ever since.

Each year the United States Department of Labor Office of Disability Employment Policy provides a

Toolkit of public domain resources in English and Spanish for organizations planning and implementing NDEAM activities. The toolkit includes the annual poster, drop-in articles, and samples such as a proclamation, a participation press release, and social media content. The toolkit also offers tips for better social media accessibility.


